Objectives

- Situate the Programme within the African and global agendas, highlighting its contributions to aspirations on rural development of smallholders as envisioned by the Agenda 2063, the 2014 Malabo Declaration and NEPAD's Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP), along with the Sustainable Development Goals and the multilateral environmental conventions, among others.
- Update participants on what is being learned from the GEF6 projects in terms of how to do integrated programming and the implications for the upcoming GEF7 cycle.
- Facilitate practical peer learning between country teams on topics related to both project approach and management, such as design and programming for resilience, monitoring of environmental and socio-economic changes in the project areas, data generation and analysis, gender mainstreaming and incentives for ecosystem services. This will include field trips hosted by the Kenya project team (Upper Tana-Nairobi Water Fund).
- Building on preliminary analysis conducted by the technical advisory group (TAG) on monitoring and assessment of environmental changes attributable to project activities, review and consolidate approaches and indicators particularly for measuring impacts on resilience for food security.
- Hold a Regional Hub planning meeting to review the hub's work plan and budget, assess progress, clarify reporting expectations and financial procedures for project partners and plan priority next steps for the Programme.



Annex: Field Trips, May 09th

The one-day visit will be organized in four parallel teams, each having approximately 15-20 participants. The teams will visit different sites in the Upper Tana Watershed with diverse contexts and experiences.

Participants will be encouraged to:

- Bring photos from other GEF-IAP-FS country projects, illustrating the farms and farmers they represent, to provide a background context to the Kenyan farmers to be visited.
- Meet extension agents and county government officials to: learn about additional activities that farmers could benefit from, apart from those financed by the Water Fund; discuss how they facilitate coordination of investments at field level (eg. interaction of WRUA plans with other initiatives such as IFAD's Upper Tana NRM Project); as well as invite collaborators who support this integration, from central level, to the IES training on coordination on Friday.
